Money, Money, Money!

Village Clerk, Joel Dutenhoefer, has put some of his currency collection in the Display Case for the month of January. Joel started collecting about 12 years ago when his father left him a small collection of bills. He didn't buy the expensive rare ones.

Joel keeps his collection in a safe and attends trade shows and auctions. The big one is the Paper Money Exbo in Chicago every March. One of the things that intrigues him the most is the beautiful art work on the large currency bills. His favorite is the Black Eagle Silver Certificate on the second shelf.

The first shelf is dedicated to these large United States Notes. There is an 1862 \$1 note which introduced the term "Greenback." The portrait on it is of Salmon P. Chase, the Secretary of the Treasury under Lincoln.

Next is an 1868 "Rainbow" note so called due to its generous use of color. George Washington's portrait and a vignette of Columbus sighting the new world makes this a beautiful bill.

The 1907 \$5 "Woodchopper" note depicts a pioneer family in a rustic setting with Alexander Hamilton's portrait on it.

The 1917 \$1 note is the last of the large size currency and features George Washington and Christopher Columbus sighting the new world.

Bills downsized with the 1928 \$1 note to economize during the financial turmoil of the 1920s. This is a limited issue currency circulated only in Puerto Rico.

All series 1928 C \$5 notes featured a portrait of Abraham Lincoln on the front with the Lincoln Memorial on the back.

The third shelf is devoted to Gold Certificates which were used almost exclusively in interbank channels to settle gold accounts. The 1906 \$20 note features gold ink color and large Roman Numerals for the demonation. The 1922 \$10 one used gold color and Roman numberals. Michael Hellegres, the first treasurer of the United States, is the portrait and the back is a brilliant orange color.
